

Florida's Medicaid Coverage Gap

Many Floridians are living without access to affordable health coverage. They can't get insurance through their jobs, can't afford private health insurance, and make **"too much"** to qualify for Florida Medicaid. **They live in what is called the "Medicaid coverage gap."**

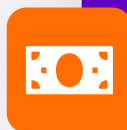
Because Florida hasn't expanded Medicaid, 570,000 residents are left without access to affordable health insurance – and without the care they need.¹



40 states have expanded Medicaid. Florida has not – and Florida's families are paying the price.

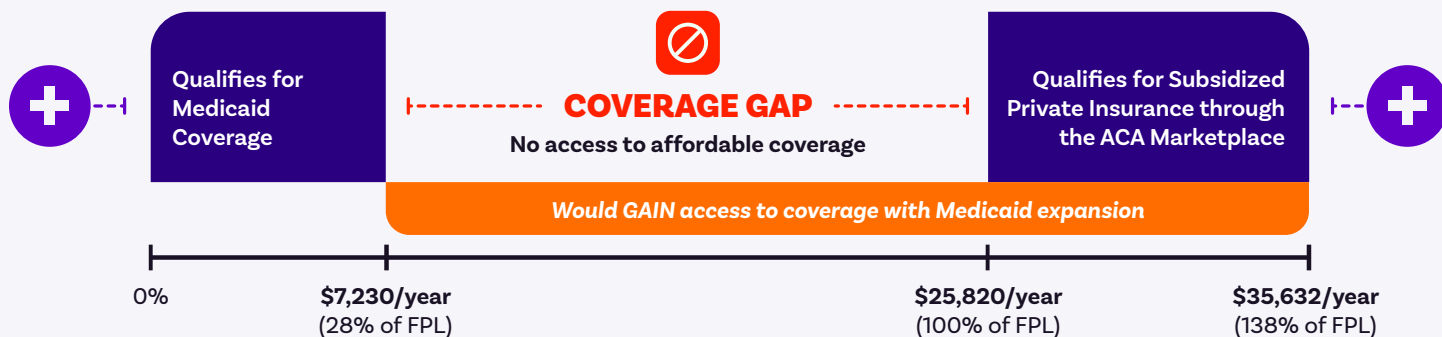


In Florida, a family of three making \$7,230 a year makes "too much" to qualify for Medicaid.²



Floridians over the age of 18 without children NEVER QUALIFY for Florida Medicaid.

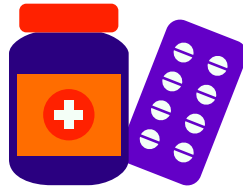

Get the medications they've been prescribed to manage their health.

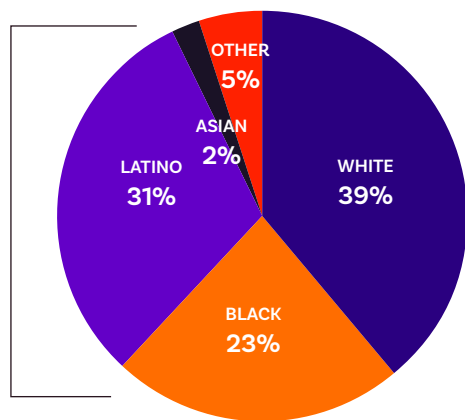


Treat chronic conditions so they can stay healthy and remain in the workforce.

The Medicaid coverage gap is contributing to **our rural healthcare crisis**. Our hospitals are shutting down at an alarming rate. Expanding Medicaid strengthens our rural hospitals and ensures they stay open — creating good paying jobs and providing critical care in our rural communities.



Medicaid expansion is good for Florida's state economy.

The federal government will cover 90% of the cost of expanding Medicaid. These federal funds would allow Florida to expand affordable health coverage to those who need it, build a healthier workforce, keep rural hospitals open, and grow our economy.¹

570,000 Floridians are being left behind without access to affordable health coverage. It's time for Florida to expand Medicaid and close the gap.
