18-minute national survey of 1,345 registered voters conducted May 15 to 26, 2025.

Fielded using YouGov's online panel.

Methods.

Includes oversamples of:

- 207 AAPI voters
- 206 Black voters
- 212 Hispanic / Latino voters


The survey included 378 Republicans, 573 Democrats, and 339 Independents.

6 Key Findings.


- 1. You have options.
- 2. There is bipartisan support for continuing Enhanced Premium Tax Credits.
- 3. There are opportunities to talk about <u>all</u> the threats together.
- 4. There are familiar challenges but your arguments are stronger.
- 5. Impacts on people matter most.
- 6. Three message frames help you talk about threats collectively: "corporate greed," "working families," and "cost of living."

Voters are in different places on the direction of the country right now, driven by political ideology.


Q: Which statement comes closer to your views, even if none are exactly right?



There might be some short term discomfort with the changes taking place in our country right now, but we will be better off in the long term.




There is a lot of uncertainty in the country right now, and it's not clear whether the changes taking place will be good or bad for the country.

Ideology also divides them on whether changes happening will help or hurt them personally – though more say they are negatively impacted.




Addressing high healthcare costs is an area of common ground.








Before messaging, there is bipartisan support for continuing Enhanced Premium Tax Credits past 2025. There are effective ways to talk about how EPTCs help people.




% Continue Enhanced Premium Tax Credits

Voters express strong, bipartisan concern when they hear about the impacts of Congress ending Enhanced Premium Tax Credits.


Even in a tough head-to-head, our pro-tax credits argument wins by +18. Republicans, however, are swayed by the opposition argument.

After hearing messages from both sides, majorities across party ID still support keeping Enhanced Premium Tax Credits. If their Member of Congress votes to end the tax credits, most voters – including over 1 in 3 Republican voters – say they would view them more negatively.

Connecting to Medicaid and SNAP cuts.

There is power in combining the Tax Credits with cuts to Medicaid and SNAP.

[Democratic Norms] Our democracy is under threat like never before, with unprecedented attacks on our basic rights and freedoms, weakening checks and balances, and undermining our courts. Instead of standing up for the rule of law and the basic tenets of our Constitution, some in Congress want to slash over \$1 trillion from healthcare, food assistance programs, and more, which would terminate health coverage for millions and increase costs for all of us.

[Tariffs] With the chaos and uncertainty of tariffs and the growing risk of a recession, Congress should be doing everything possible to lower costs for working families. But instead, some in Congress want to slash over \$1 trillion from healthcare, which would terminate health coverage for millions and increase costs for all of us.

[Racial Inequities] Black, Latino, and other communities of color already face too many barriers in the way of getting the basic healthcare they need. Congress should be working to ensure everyone in this country has equal access to affordable healthcare. But instead, some in Congress want to slash over \$1 trillion from healthcare, which would terminate health coverage for millions and increase costs for all of us.

[Federal Overreach] The Federal <u>government's</u> and DOGE's spending cuts have gone too fast and too far. Dictating how states can provide affordable healthcare and who they can cover is extreme government overreach. And now, some in Congress want to slash over \$1 trillion from healthcare, which would terminate health coverage for millions and increase costs for all of us.

Why we MUST engage



The good news: overwhelming, bipartisan majorities:

- are concerned about the cost of healthcare (86%)
- believe the government should...
 - ensure everyone has equal access to affordable healthcare and food (87%)
 - step in to help when people can't afford food, healthcare, or other basic necessities (87%)
 - Protect people by reining in big corporations who are raking in huge profits while raising prices on everyday Americans (92%)
- believe the government shouldn't...
 - o cut programs that help people who are struggling financially to afford basic needs like healthcare and food (81%)

The bad news: less than half (49%) have heard anything about cuts to healthcare.

We hold the keys to winning



- **1. People are with us.** This fight is a matter of boosting awareness and communicating the threat. We don't have to convince anyone these cuts will hurt.
- 2. Despite polarization across many other issues-people are concerned about the impact these cuts will have on their neighbors, their communities, and those most vulnerable.
- 3. Those who are aware strongly oppose these cuts and are willing to hold decision makers accountable for their choices.
- 4. Despite high levels of support for cutting government spending and misinformation on waste, fraud, and abuse-when put head to head-they oppose cuts and support protecting healthcare.

Punishing millions of working families by terminating their healthcare and taking away food will only make our country sicker and leave millions of children at risk of hunger."

85% of voters say this is concerning

Republicans	73%
Independents	83%
Democrats	97%

32% (highest) ranked this as most concerning vs. Medicaid cuts, Medicaid + EPTC cuts, cuts to all basic needs—though all received above 80% concerning.

Tax credit takeaways



Keep it simple & big picture

This is about:

- terminating healthcare
- increasing our healthcare costs

Connect to corporate greed

Just another excuse to cut our healthcare to pay for tax breaks for big corporations and wealthy donors.

Focus on people

Caregivers, small business owners, working families, 50-64 year olds. Everyone will feel higher costs.

Part of a broader attack

Canceling healthcare tax credits and cutting Medicaid and SNAP is a direct hit on working class families.

Core message - tax credits



Putting it all together...

If Congress ends the Enhanced Premium Tax Credits, 4.2 million people will have their **healthcare terminated** and the cost of health insurance could double for more than 18 million others-including **caregivers**, **small business owners**, **working families and 50-64 year olds who don't yet qualify for Medicare**. Some working families will see the cost of their health insurance increase by over \$8,000 a year. Nobody can afford that. Congress should rein in big corporations who are making healthcare so expensive for everyone instead of **cutting our healthcare to give massive tax breaks** to the same wealthy corporations ripping us off.

Tax credit cheat sheet



Keep definitions straightforward-they lower costs.

Enhanced Premium Tax Credits lower the cost of healthcare for more than 22 million people.

Describe who gets hurt.

• If Congress ends the Enhanced Premium Tax Credits, 4.2 million people will have their healthcare terminated and premiums could more than double for over 18 million others including family caregivers, small business owners, freelancers and gig workers, and people age 50-64 who don't yet qualify for Medicare.

Identify their motive-corporate greed.

• Some in Congress are just looking for an excuse to cut our healthcare in order to give massive tax breaks to the **wealthy corporations** who rip us off.

*Note: You can use Enhanced Premium Tax Credits, Affordable Care Act Tax Credits, or Healthcare Tax Credits interchangeably—how you define them is more important.
