Congress Just Passed the Largest Healthcare Cut in History

Share the facts. Here's what happens next:

This bill cuts more than \$1 trillion from our healthcare. From slashing Medicaid to ending the healthcare tax credits to enacting onerous work requirements, most people will be unable to escape the impact of this legislation. While families will struggle, Congress and the Administration have done nothing to rein in large corporations responsible for out-of-control healthcare costs, preferring instead to give tax breaks to the super wealthy.



Coverage Losses

- 15.1 million seniors, children, veterans, people with disabilities, and working families will have their health coverage terminated.
- **10.9 million people** will lose coverage from cuts to Medicaid and the ACA marketplace.
- **4.2 million people** will lose affordable coverage when healthcare tax credits expire
- · Around 1 million immigrants who live and work in the U.S. will have their **premium** tax credits and Medicare coverage taken away entirely.

These cuts will disproportionately harm marginalized communities.

- 4.1 million Latinos will have their health insurance terminated.
- 2.6 million Black people will have their health insurance terminated.
- 1.1 million Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander people will have their health insurance terminated.



Cost Increases

- 22 million people, including 5 million small business owners and self-employed workers, will see their costs dramatically increase with cuts to healthcare tax credits.
- · Families, including those with employersponsored insurance, will be forced to pay up to ~\$900 more in yearly out-of-pocket costs.
- Monthly premiums are likely to **double** for people in at least 12 states. For example, a 60-year-old couple making \$85,000 per year could see their annual premium costs jump from \$6,900 to \$22,300.
- On average, annual out-of-pocket premiums will increase by \$760 every year and climb upwards of \$3,000 or more in hardest hit rural counties.



Less Access and More Medical Debt

- 330 rural hospitals and 570 nursing homes across the country could be forced to close.
- More than 1.1 million women could lose access to affordable healthcare, including contraception, cancer screenings, and STI testing and treatments.
- At least **5.4 million more people** are estimated to go into medical debt. And families whose health coverage is terminated could see their medical debt increase by as much as \$22,280.
